1. ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT INITIATIVES

Economic empowerment is one of the major ingredients in enabling women and youth to break free from the cycle of poverty and achieve financial independence. The Empowerment Initiative for Rural Women and Adolescents implemented several initiatives throughout 2023 to promote economic empowerment among its beneficiaries.

These initiatives include the HarvestHers project, entrepreneurship training, business development support, and Tukashi Beekeeping.



Life, entrepreneurship and financial literacy skills: Capital alone does not guarantee the success of a business. It is for this reason that we undertook a training in entrepreneurship and business development for the women of Rufunsa. Our short course aimed at exposing women to basic entrepreneurship skills, financial literacy, financial management and balancing work and life. The goal was to help women not only kickstart their businesses but also sustain them. As part of the training, a successful completion of the short course also gave women access to micro, non-collateralbased loans available in the district to start and small businesses within their boost their communities.



2. Tukashi Beekeeping Project: The project aimed at promoting women's access to land and rights, boosting their economic status by offering alternative sources of income, advocating for the forest conservation and promoting community stewardship towards managing and taking care of resources. We trained over 40 women on how to make their beehive in 4 different villages in Rufunsa district translating into 100 beehives.



3. HarvestHers Project: We support rural women in agriculture with skills, tools and knowledge of climate– friendly agriculture practice. Besides this, the HarvestHers women also benefit from a revolving groundnuts passon seed grant.



OUR AREAS OF IMPACT

2. MENTORSHIP PROGRAMS FOR PRIMARY SCHOOL GIRLS AND BOYS

1.Engagement of Boys: Our commitment to adolescents in rural communities remains central to our work. Throughout 2023, we remained focused on advancing empowerment programs not only for adolescent girls in schools but also adolescent boys. These programs aims at teaching young girls and boys good social and life skills, personal development, decision making and goal-setting for positive health, life and education outcomes.



In 2022, the Girls Can Project was initiated in a single school with the ambitious goal of empowering school girls aged 10 to 19. As of 2023, the project has blossomed, expanding its reach to 4 different schools within the region. The project's overaching objective is to empower school girls through tailor-made sessions covering a spectrum of essential topics. These include empowerment sessions, sexual and reproductive health education, and literacy coupled with digital skills sessions. By focusing on the diverse needs of girls within the 10 to 19 age range, we aim to equip them with the knowledge and skills necessary to navigate their formative years successfully.

Growing Support and Partnerships:

The Girls Can Project has not only gained momentum but has also attracted support from esteemed funding organizations. We are grateful for the backing of the Girls Opportunity Alliance (Obama Foundation), the U.S Embassy in Zambia, Daring Girls and other dedicated partners.











1. Engagement and Reach:

Through consistent and impactful efforts, we successfully engaged with over 200 girls in weekly sessions. These sessions provided a safe space for learning, sharing, and growing together.

2. Customized Empowerment:

Drawing inspiration from empowerment curriculums developed by organizations such as **UNESCO, UNICEF, Population Council,** and **Girls Rising**, we took the initiative to customize content to suit our local context. This ensures that the material is not only relevant but also resonates with the unique challenges and aspirations of the girls we serve.

3. ENHANCING EDUCATION ACCESSIBILITY

2. Supplementary Feeding Programs to Support Pupils In Rural Schools:

In Rufunsa, there is an intersection between poverty and limited access to education. Many children from underprivileged communities find it hard to attend school and if they do, lose focus because they often go hungry.

As part of our ongoing commitment to support education in rural areas, we initiated empowerment programs in three different schools across Rufunsa District. During these sessions, one issue emerged – hungry children.

In light of this, we partnered with the **Furrer Foundation's Community Training Farm!** Together, we started supplying wholesome sour milk, a beloved Zambian staple, to the young learners.

Sour milk isn't just delicious; it's incredibly nutritious, offering numerous health benefits. Children deserve proper nutrition to thrive in their educational journey, and this collaboration aims to make that a reality.





OUR AREAS OF IMPACT | 4. INTERGRATED EMPOWERMENT PROGRAMS

- 1. Boot camps for exam preparation: Every year, we organise a special event for rural 7th graders, preparing them for the transition to secondary school. In our community, low transition rates and fear of failure are common challenges. Our event covered exam readiness, time management, coping with anxiety, and bouncing back from setbacks. One unique aspect of our event was peer-to-peer engagement We involve recent graduates, no more than two years out of 7th grade, to connect with and inspire the current 7th graders. Their experiences provide valuable insights and encouragement.
- 2. Small rewards for best-performing pupils to boost motivation: Rural schools, which often operate on limited resources and poor conditions as compared to their urban and peri-urban counterparts are particularly vulnerable to student disengagement. One of the urgent issues rural adolescents face is a lack of motivation for school, therefore, the awards presented to well-deserving top performers at Kalundu Primary School from grades 4-7 in Rufunsa district was a push for both recipients and non-recipients. It served as a drive to recipients and a challenge to non-recipients to aim for the top.
- **3. Community Engagement:** Throughout the year we created invited spaces for community engagement meetings to facilitate dialogue to address the challenges faced by adolescent girls in rural communities. Community engagement thrives on participation and voice. When everyone contributes, we see innovation, inclusivity, and stronger bonds. We strive to bring communities at the centre of discussing issues affecting them, for collective action.


4. Leaving No One Behind; The Boys Too Need Us!

Our Empowerment Program for Rural Adolescents is tailor-made to address the needs of both boys and girls in school and beyond. By including both boys and girls, we're championing gender equality and challenging traditional roles, paving the way for a more inclusive and equitable society.

2023 took us on a transformative journey when we rebranded to include adolescent boys in our empowerment programs. We undertook working with adolescent boys, a pivotal moment that reshaped our approach towards empowerment.

Our journey took an unexpected turn when adolescent boys began asking the crucial question: "When will it be our turn?" This simple yet profound inquiry served as a wake-up call, reminding us that empowerment should be inclusive and diverse. The boys' curiosity sparked a realization that our mission to empower communities for inclusive growth was incomplete without addressing the needs and aspirations of young boys. We acknowledged the need to adapt our approach in response to community dynamics and in the new year we will expand to include more boys.





5. Supporting Teenage mothers in school and vulnerable children

in view of our commitment to empowering rural school girls who have experienced teen pregnancy. Our mission is to provide them with the support they need to overcome challenges and achieve their dreams.

Here is how we helped throughout 2023:

- SRHR Information: We provided comprehensive Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) information to help these young moms make informed decisions about their health and well-being.
- School Re-entry Discussions: We engaged in meaningful discussions to explore the best options for school re-entry.
- Child Care Support: Addressing childcare issues is crucial for these young moms. We offer assistance and resources to help them manage their responsibilities as mothers while pursuing their education.



5. ADVOCACY & AWARENESS **RAISING CAMPAIGNS**

To drive sustainable change and create an enabling environment for women adolescents, the Empowerment Initiative conducted advocacy and awareness campaigns throughout the year. These campaigns aimed at challenging gender norms, raise awareness about women's rights, and advocate for policy changes to address gender inequalities.

The organisation collaborated with local communities, government entities, and other stakeholders to promote dialogue, share knowledge, and foster a supportive ecosystem for women's empowerment. Through workshops, community events, and media engagement, the initiative amplified the voices of women and adolescents. encouraging them to become active participants in advocating for their rights.





ZambiaActNow: Last year as alliance partners: Empowerment Initiative for Rural Women and Adolescents, Zambian Feminist Voices Collective, Bingiza Foundation and Children Inspired Evolution -CIE through ZambiaActNow Campaign pledged their commitment through collaborative efforts to unite against GBV through challenging the stereotypes that perpetuate violence.














PARTNERSHIPS AND COLLABORATIONS

Apart from the many impact areas that EIRWA is involved in, there are other activities that compliment the work that we do. WithThese include partnerships & collaborations, national and international commemorations, funding & support and community engagements.









- We collaborated with our long-time partners
 Bingiza Foundation to deliver a capacity-building
 workshop on Sexual Reproductive Health Rights
 (SRHR) and reusable sanitary cloth pad making. We
 facilitated the training in pad making which was
 delivered to a diverse group of participants.
- We were invited by the Centre for Global Education in Canada to deliver a virtual presentation on Women's Day, under the theme: Embrace Equity. where we delivered a keynote speech/presentation to adolescents between the ages of 10 and 15 on how each one of us can actively support gender equity within our sphere of influence. We continue to challenge gender stereotypes, call out discrimination, draw attention to bias, and seek out inclusion.
- In light of our commitment to empowering adolescent girls and boys in rural communities, we also partnered with Mission of Mercy, -an association of the BMGA Foundation alumni to deliver the event. We engaged the participants in sessions on; promoting realization, access and use of life and soft skills (with a focus on communication skills, time management, emotional intelligence, goal setting and decision-making), increasing critical awareness, fostering agency, career diversity, and enhancing opportunities for further education and employment.



OTHER ACTIVITIES: NATIONAL & INTERNATIONAL COMMEMORATIONS

Throughout 2023, we joined the rest of the country and the world in commemorating national and international commemorations.



1. On Women's Day, we gathered to celebrate women's achievements and contributions to the fight for women's rights, recognise the current struggles and ponder upon the roadmap to the achievement of a gender-equal, violence-free future.



2. National Youth Day.

We joined the rest of the country in commemorating the national youth day under the theme "Transforming Minds for accelerated youth development". Achieving accelerated youth development requires multifaceted input of efforts, from both youths and leaders.



3. National Farmers Day: In these challenging times, we cannot stress enough the significance of local production, embracing indigenous methods of food preservation, and promoting organic farming. Moreover, it's crucial to acknowledge the vital role that women play in food production and their role in combating climate change through agriculture.

4. Celebrating the International Day of the Girl Child: On this special day, we had the privilege of bringing together young girls from three different schools for an inspiring event. In line with this year's theme, "Invest in girls' rights: our leadership, our well-being," we joined forces with the Furrer Foundation to empower and expose these young minds to a world of diverse career opportunities. The highlight of our day was an eye-opening tour of the newly established Zambia Industrial Parks/Entrepreneurs College. Here, brilliant women in various fields demonstrated their remarkable skills, not only showcasing their expertise but also sharing their incredible journeys. They spoke of overcoming self-doubt and breaking free from stereotypes that limit what girls can achieve.







5. International Day of Rural Women: We joined the rest of the world in the celebration and commemoration of international day of rural women under the theme "Rural Women Cultivating Good Food for All."

As EIRWA, we remain dedicated to empower, support and provide opportunities for rural women to thrive in feeding their families and communities.

We spread Awareness on HIV Prevention and GBV through Art and Culture and conducted a community outreach program to educate the public on issues related to HIV prevention, treatment and control, human rights, and community-based interventions.

We utilized creative and entertaining means to sensitize the masses on these crucial topics. The event culminated in a spectacular showcase of art, culture, and dance, marking a stylish end to the year.

2023 FINANCIAL SUMMARY




